Journey Into Missions by Don Slusher

Off to Argentina:

As we were leaving Peru, we had to overnight in the city of Chicalyo, Peru. During our overnight stay we met Mr. Bruno Radii from Pilar, Argentina. He lead us in a evening devotion. He spoke in broken English but his words were well delivered and inspiring. It was not long before we realized that we were in the presence of a very special individual. A few months later I heard him referred to as the Billy Graham of South America. Over the years I was privileged to serve with him throughout Argentina. A couple of years ago there was an e-mail sent out from South America that Bruno had been stricken with a serious heart attack while serving in Uruguay. He died a few days later. Those that knew him realized that the world had been deprived of one of the great visionaries of the modern day church. I will never forget the last time that I spent with him. We were sitting in a restaurant in one of the suburbs of Buenos Aries, Argentina. Bruno took his paper place mat and began sketching his plan of how to evangelize all of northern Argentina. After he finished his explanation, I quietly folded the place mat, put it in my pocket and brought it home with me. It is still in my position and I could not place a value on the friendship that this piece of paper represents.

I feel like I have given you the beginning of the story of our work in Argentina and the end with the death of Bruno. However, there is a span of years between the two events that lead to numerous trips and experiences that I will be relating to you over the next few missions reports. So, lets load up and head out for Argentina.

My first trip to Argentina was in 1997. My dad was also on this trip. Our job was to build a mission station just outside Buenos Aries, Argentina in the small city of Pilar. Bruno Radii had managed to purchase a tract of land in what at that time was considered to be in the countryside. As we made other future trips this countryside became a part of the city as growth took place.

We were given the task of building several houses that would be occupied by missionary families that would be assigned to the mission station. The station would eventually have a communications center, a small hotel for visitors, a prefab church factory, apartments and meeting rooms. On my third trip to Argentina, we began the construction of the communications center. It actually had a television studio in addition to a recording studio. On our last trip to Argentina we got to visit the finished complex and spend some time in the communications center. It definitely had a WOW! factor. Seldom do we get to go to a site and see the beginning of the project and then return years later to see the finished product. We all had a tremendous since of accomplishment as we walked through the complex on that last visit.

Now, back to 1997. Upon our arrival in Pilar, each of us were assigned a missionary family who would host us during our stay. My dad and I, along with a couple of others on the team, were assigned to Laura and Ron Sylvestor. They had a teenage daughter, Hannah, living with them and other grown children living back in the states. Laura, Ron and Hannah became very close friends with my dad and me. A few months later Nancy made her first trip to Argentina and she also established a close relationship with the Sylvestors. Over the years, we lost contact with Laura and Ron with the exception of a brief time when Hannah contacted us about her upcoming wedding. A few months ago we were surprised to get an e-mail from Laura. They had left the mission field and were now pastoring a couple of churches in the mountains of Kentucky. Hopefully we will be able to spend some time with this wonderful couple with some exchange visits.

I realize that this report is a little different in that it does not tell of a particular event but it illustrates how people come into our lives that make a tremendous impact. I'm sure that everyone of us can tell of events and people that have changed our lives forever. Hopefully, everyone who reads this will can say that they have met the one individual that has made all the difference – Jesus Christ.

CHARTERED BUS TRIP TO CREATION MUSEUM AND PLANETARIUM

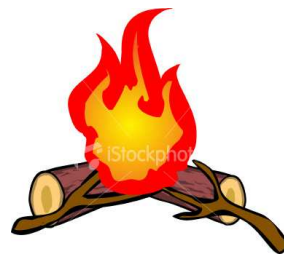

MEDIA MATTERS By Terry Slusher

Since we moved into the Worship Center, I've had dozens of people ask me about the sound system and why it is difficult to hear. The designs provided by all three companies that bid on our audio and video systems included sound absorbing panels to be placed on the walls. We simply did not have the money at the time to complete the system, but the eventual placement of the sound panels was understood to be a necessary part of the system. I've had people ask questions like "Couldn't we just put up some hangings on the wall and get away with something cheaper?" Let's put that question into perspective...What if the question had been, "Couldn't we cover the roof with tarps instead of roofing shingles?" Yes, but that wouldn't do the job appropriately. I thought more information about how these panels work might be instructive...following is an article with some relative information:

"The principles of sound absorption have been around for hundreds of years. Medieval churches used ash-filled pots embedded in the walls to absorb sound. These evolved into today's concept of sound-absorbing panels, commonly called "acoustical panels." The basic construction of an acoustical panel includes a sound-absorbing substrate material and a covering of cloth, vinyl, or other material. ...Today's acoustical panels use substrates that are more efficient at absorbing sound and meet modern safety standards. Some panels use two or more substrate layers in one panel to provide special properties.

How They Work

Acoustical panels control sound by selectively absorbing sound waves, thereby reducing echoes and re-echoes. All of the various substrates absorb sound by trapping it in a labyrinth of fibers or open cells within the material. As sound travels through this maze, it loses energy due to both the travel and the direction changes within the material...

...Echo! Echo! Echo!

To paraphrase a popular southern comedian, "If you miss the Sunday sermon and can come in on Wednesday and still hear it, you may need acoustical panels." The choir director may love a room like this but the congregation will get a headache from "ear strain" trying to understand the minister...

...The problem can be excess reverberation time—a measure of how rapidly a sound decays in the room. Reverberation time can be estimated by initiating a loud noise—a loud clap, tipping over a folding table, or slamming a hymnal shut—and timing its decay. With this information and the spatial volume of the room, the existing sound absorption in the room can be calculated. The basic formula for measuring sound absorption is the Sabine formula, a simple algebraic equation named for the man who developed it a hundred years ago. The Sabine equation is used with the desired reverberation time to yield the necessary absorption for that room. The difference between the necessary absorption and the existing absorption indicates the degree of requirement for acoustical panels...

...There are, of course, several factors that keep this from being too simple...if the reverberation

is not particularly high and clarity is a problem, the answer may be diffusion of sound, rather than absorption. The difference is that while absorption reduces reverberation by controlling reflected sound, diffusion lowers the perceived sound level by scattering (diffusing) sound over a wide area. Diffusion can help achieve a space that is not too dry for the choir, nor too reverberant for the minister's message. (The design for TBC calls for both absorbing and diffusing panels)...

...(Another) consideration is that absorption characteristics depend on the sound frequency. Some acoustical problems must be resolved by addressing absorption or diffusion of selected frequencies.

One common use of acoustical panels is to eliminate stray reflections from stage monitors, especially where feedback is a problem. They are also used on side walls to avoid slap-back and side-to-side flutters. Panels prevent coloration of the main sound source by eliminating reflections that recombine with the direct sound to reinforce or cancel certain frequencies. Without reflection control, the sound heard by the audience can be very different than that intended...

Built-In Acoustics

...A room is acoustically "active" or, in a sense, "alive." A dip in frequency response is not cured with a peak equalizer, pumping more energy into that frequency. The room will absorb the new energy and the electronic correction will not be a complete cure. Eventually, extreme electronic compensation will cause undesirable audible effects. Whatever the acoustical needs of the room are, it can safely be said that the budget for acoustical control materials will be significantly less than the cost of the second and third failed sound systems...

...Acoustical wall panels can usually be made to blend with the sanctuary interior using the 48 standard colors available to all panel manufacturers. Custom fabrics can be used but usually at additional cost. When choosing custom fabrics, make sure they are acoustically transparent or have known sound absorbing properties of their own. Also make sure the fabric is made of synthetic fibers so it will not be affected by moisture and temperature changes. Fabrics should also be visually non-directional: color and texture should appear the same from all angles...

...Advanced planning for acoustics (before building) can save much time, effort, and money later. Acoustical panels can be part of a planned sound-control strategy for a new building, or as solutions to sound problems in existing rooms. With the principles of acoustics well developed over the past 100 years, it is possible to predict acoustic results and costs in advance." *Nick Colleran is a member of the Acoustical Society of America, past president of the Society of Professional Audio Recording Studios (SPARS), and former president of the Virginia Production Services Association (VPSA).
